The Presentation of the Lord

From the Desk of Father George

Greetings parishioners and friends of St. Julie's,

Have you ever thought about the many blessings that layer in abundance throughout our lives? Of how we stand not only in awe, but in faith as well?

This weekend at our Sunday Masses, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord when, as the Scriptures tell us: "The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'Behold, this child is destined to be the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted - and you yourself as sword will pierce - so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed.' "

On Monday, February 3rd, the church celebrates the Feast of Saint Blaise. As a people of faith, we know more about the devotion to St. Blaise by Christians around the world than we know about the saint himself. We know that Bishop Blaise was martyred in the city of Sebaste, Armenia, in 316. However, it was not until 400 years later that the accounts of his 'actions' were put into writing. Blaise was remembered as a good bishop who worked hard to encourage the spiritual and physical health of his people. But as is often the case, there were then, as there are now, persons who did not want his type around. And so Blaise was apparently forced to flee to the backcountry area where he lived as a hermit in solitude and prayer. It is according to legend that one day a group of hunters came across Blaise kneeling in prayer surrounded by patiently waiting wolves, lions and bears. As the hunters hauled Blaise off to prison, a mother came to him with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. Upon Blaise's command, the child coughed up the bone and was rescued from his condition and near death. Once in Sebaste, Agricolaus, the governor of Cappadocia, tried to force Blaise to sacrifice to pagan idols. Blaise refused and was tortured mercilessly. In the end, after having been beaten and then hung from a tree while his flesh was torn from his body, he was beheaded, suffering a martyr's death.

As a people who struggle with suffering and illness, we should pray not only for God's healing grace in our life journey, but also for the courage to bear the pain or suffering with the faith of one whose eyes are focused upon the things of heaven. The blessing of the sick is an ancient custom, rooted in imitation of Christ and his apostles. In the United States the annual blessing of throats is a traditional sign of the struggle against illness in the life of the Christian.

Throats will be Blessed after all the Masses this weekend and at the 9:00 Chapel Mass on Monday February 3rd - the Feast of Saint Blaise.

Blessings do layer in an abundance throughout our lives. Do you know the tradition behind "God bless you" when someone sneezes?
